Please mark your calendars! New Mexico's Statewide Student Assessment dates are approaching. All listed assessments must be administered in-person and on campus - All TA students need to plan to participate and show what you have learned this year! These assessments are mandatory. Make-up testing will be scheduled as needed.

- March 27th & April 1st 11th graders will take the Assessment of Science Readiness (ASR).
- March 26th & 31st 5th and 8th grade students will take the Assessment of Science Readiness (ASR).
- April 7th & 14th Measures of Student Success & Achievement (MSSA) in Math and English Language Arts will be given to all students in grades 5-8.
- April 8th: SAT All 11th graders are required to take the SAT in preparation for college or career. Students will be assigned to one of these two testing dates.
- April 29th May 6th -Spring MAP testing This short-cycle assessment measures students growth over the course of the year and helps us make sure students are making adequate progress towards grade level goals. Testing will be held April 30th & 5th for middle schoolers; April 29th & May 6th for high school students.



Happy March! If students are doing the same internship, they just need to complete a March and May progress report this semester to continue to get elective credit. March progress reports are due March 7th

• If students start a new internship, they MUST complete another Internship Agreement and Memorandum of Understanding and turn it in the internship classroom.

If you are new to TA or you have just started a new internship please come talk to Mr. J. Weisfeld ASAP for an orientation. Internship will not be allowed until each candidate has done an orientation with Mr. J. Weisfeld. Only after new students have been oriented, will they be invited to join the Internship Classroom.

Taos Academy's Internship Program gives elective credit to high school students who are volunteering in the community, participating in a sports program, or gaining job experience. In order to receive credit, students must have the business or organization they are working with and parent/guardian fill out these forms and documentation or hours:

- 1. "Memorandum of Understanding"
- 2. "Internship Agreement"
- 3. <u>Summer</u>, Fall (<u>October</u> and <u>December</u>), Spring (<u>March</u> and <u>May</u>) progress reports (1 for summer, 2 per fall and spring semester)

\*\*\*If an internship is outside the TA community (not eSports, Science Club,) then follow the below process to turn in forms:

- 1. Print from the Classroom or get copies from Mr. J.
- 2. Fill out forms and get signatures in pen.
- 3. Download the Google Classroom app.
- 4. Take photographs of the signed documents then turn each photograph in to the Internship Classroom in to the correct assignment.
- \* Each document MUST be turned in to the appropriate dated assignment and will not be given credit until they are in their correct assignment (ie-don't turn in the Memorandum into the Agreement assignment)

The "Memorandum of Understanding" is signed by TA's director and by the business/organization/team at which the student is interning. This document is an agreement between the school and the business and it protects the business while students are participating in the internship.

The "Internship Agreement" is a form that details the volunteer, sports, or job opportunity. It must be signed by the student, mentor, coach or job supervisor, the parent, and TA's director.

<sup>\*</sup>Students/families keep the paper copies for their records.

The "Progress Reports" are dated and must be completed by the supervising party-2 for each semester of internship credit (only one progress report is needed for a summer internship) and must include a supervisor signature and hours. Progress reports that are turned late, risk the loss of internship credit.

# For Fall/Spring:

Both progress reports turned in on time= A grade Only one progress report on time= C grade No progress report=No credit

Summer Progress Reports only require one signature and will be completed once school starts in the fall.

All parties must provide their contact information for the form to be considered complete.

If a form is missing or incomplete, a student will not receive credit for their internship. Contact Mr. Weisfeld at <a href="weisfeld@taosacademy.org">weisfeld@taosacademy.org</a> if you have any questions.

This program is a unique blend of environmental education and outdoor adventure that is fun, educational, and physically challenging. We will thoughtfully engage students while exploring connections to the natural world through active, hands-on activities. Topics include: Ecology, natural systems, teamwork and leadership, outdoor recreation, natural and cultural history, energy systems, survival skills and more. Activities may include (weather permitting): hiking, biking, fort-building.

- <u>Culinary Arts</u>—taught by Claudia Abeyta—<u>Tuesdays and Thursdays 12:30-2:15</u>
   Class is an experiential class where students learn how to combine flavors and ingredients in order to fully express their creativity. We will focus on technical skills and foundational techniques throughout the class to help you become a truly great chef.
- <u>Electronics and Programming</u> Taught by Bill Hood <u>Tuesdays and Thursdays</u>
   12:30-2:15 Students will become familiar with constructing their own circuits! We introduce programming to the very circuits the students have created. This is a preparatory course and prerequisite for Unity.
- Music taught by Billy Archuleta Tuesdays and Thursdays 12:30-2:15 If you enjoy music and want to learn more about it and how to play it on your own, this is a great opportunity for you to do so. We will have fun working together to learn the different aspects of music from the basics of music theory, how to read a music staff, what time signatures are, and what is a "whole" note and a "half" note. We'll learn about some of the different instruments used to make music, and how to play them. This class will give you the basic skills you need to play the instrument of your choice. Who knows, you may find that you'll want to learn more than one instrument. So, I want us to have fun learning and discovering as much as we can about music. Are you ready?

   Pueblo/Yakama/Nez Perce Native American history through the Indigenous Peoples perspective. This class is open to all MS students. Come learn about the land and its history in a unique way.
- Theatre- taught by John Biscello-Tuesdays and Thursdays 2:15 4:00. Enter the marvelous multi-verse of acting and drama, and bring to life the characters that live inside you. Through a variety of dramatic games, exercises, improv and movement, develop your performing skills while working with an ensemble in staging skits, scenes and short plays. A range of styles and genres, from comedy, tragedy, mystery, sci-fi, satire, and more, will be the mash-up ingredients in our creation of live theater....all you need to bring is a sense of play and the spirit of imagination.

Middle School STEM + Art Institute: First quarter STEM offerings will be available for registration beginning March 4, 2025. All classes are 0.25 elective credit and grades are posted on transcripts. All classes follow Taos Academy policies. Last Day to drop a class is March 25, 2025 and must be done in writing to Ms. Jamie Lucero-Martinez -no exceptions. <a href="mailto:jlucero-martinez@taosacademy.org">jlucero-martinez@taosacademy.org</a> ALL registration must be done in the STEM Office with Cruz Duran. Materials fees will be \$10 for all courses. Fee payment is required for registration. This will assist in covering some materials cost for classes or help repair borrowed equipment. Space is limited. \*If a course is dropped by the student a fee credit will be given towards another course. No Refunds.\*

**REMINDER:** MS Students may not take the same course consecutively. Students wanting to repeat a course will be placed on the waitlist until after the first day of classes. If there is room in the class after the first day then students on the waitlist will be added based on the order they signed up. No changes will be made after the drop date.

\*STEM Instructors may drop students for low participation with two written notices to parents/students. No instructor initiated student drops will be made after April 7th, 2025. No fee credit toward future courses.
