<u>STEM+Art Institute Classes available</u> – STEM Institute classes are a wonderful opportunity for students to work with talented professionals in our community. Class sizes are small and space is

limited. To sign up, pay \$10 materials fee per class, to Cruz Duran in the STEM Building or via mail. This materials fee will reserve a space in the class. Space will only be reserved when the fee has been paid. These classes are graded electives and are posted on the final report card. Current third quarter STEM+Arts Institute classes end on Thursday, March 10th.

Please mark your calendar! New Mexico's Required Statewide Student Assessment dates are approaching. All listed assessments must be administered in-person and on campus. The following is a brief description of upcoming dates and grades affected:

- Assessment of Science Readiness (ASR)* The ASR measures science proficiency aligned to the New Mexico STEM Ready! Science Standards. The assessment is required annually for students in grades 5, 8 and 11.
 - 5th and 8th grade ASR testing days are: Monday, April 11th, 2022 and Monday, April 18th, 2022.
 - o 11th grade ASR testing days are: Tuesday, March 29th and Thursday, March 31st, 2022.
- Measures of Student Success & Achievement (MSSA)* The MSSA is the summative assessment in math, English language arts, and Spanish language arts for students in grades 3-8, aligned to the New Mexico Common Core Standards and Common Core Español Standards for SLA. The assessment measures a student's grade level proficiency and progress toward college and/or career readiness.
 - Middle school 5th thru 8th grade testing days are: Monday, March 28th and Wednesday, March 30th, 2022.
- <u>SAT School Day*</u> The SAT is a national assessment developed by The College Board to
 measure knowledge and skills that can consistently predict a student's success in college and
 workforce training programs. The SAT is administered annually to all students in <u>grade 11</u>. The
 SAT is a single day administration for standard administration with no accommodations.
 Students will be notified which day or dates they will test.
 - o 11th grade test dates: April 13th, 14th, 19th, 20th.



Restorative Practices: How to Offer and Accept an Apology

Offering and Accepting an apology is important.

- 1. It allows both parties a chance to understand the real issue at hand. This is the **cognitive** part of the conversation an acknowledgement of the *problem*.
- 2. It allows both parties the chance to understand the feelings involved. This is the **emotional** part of the conversation an acknowledgement of the *feelings*.
- 3. It allows for both parties to move beyond the immediate issue to the **restoration** of the relationship.

Two of many ways to Accept an Apology

- Because you know that hurt me, I can accept your apology.

We know our students have been feeling overwhelmed and stressed with all the changes and challenges that have happened over the past couple of years. Anxiety and Depression is reaching crisis levels for all ages. For our students especially, it is a tough thing to balance surviving a pandemic while learning, socializing and just growing up in general.

Please have conversations with your child about their mental health. One of the biggest protective factors for kids is having conversations about tough topics with an adult that they love or trust. We tell students to ask for help before things get bad. Reach out to our school counselors, to your child's doctor and/or seek counseling outside of school.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The National Hispanic Institute (NHI) and the University of New Mexico are partnering to host the 2022 Dionisio "Dennis" Chavez New Mexico LDZ for New Mexico high school students.

This year's event will host 150 top students in a weeklong leadership experience on the UNM campus June 12-19, 2022, and highlight the legacy of late Dionisio "Dennis" Chavez. The program is made possible with the help of special funding from the New Mexico Legislature introduced by State Sen. Michael Padilla.

PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

- 10th or 11th grade students
- Must have a minimum of a 3.2/4.0 grade point average (GPA) or better
- Students from the state of New Mexico
- Enrollment in a college-bound high school graduation plan

Applying to college can seem daunting, and the prospect of paying for it can seem even more overwhelming. *But it doesn't have to be.* The College Prep Scholars Program equips high-achieving high school juniors from low-income backgrounds with the knowledge, confidence, and resources to apply to top colleges.

Eligibility Requirements

Academically outstanding high school juniors from families earning less than \$65,000/year for a family of four.

Why apply as a junior? Being a College Prep Scholar is a notable distinction that shows our college partners that you are a competitive candidate for admission. In addition, your application will automatically carry over for the National College Match when you're a senior, giving you a head start on applying for a full four-year scholarship to our college partners. College Prep Scholars are nearly five times more likely than other applicants to receive full four-year scholarships through the National College Match.



The March progress report has been posted and is due March 3rd. Turn it in to the Google Classroom in digital form.

If you are new to TA, ask your advisor to invite you to the classroom or email Mr. J Weisfeld to request an invite to the classroom. All forms and information will be done in this classroom and are editable. In order to begin an internship, each student MUST accept the invite and submit all digital forms to this classroom. No more paper forms please (uploaded photos to Docs of paper forms are the best).

Taos Academy's Internship Program gives elective credit to high school students who are volunteering in the community, participating in a sports program, or gaining job experience. In order to receive credit, students must have the business or organization they are working with fill out these three forms and documentation or hours:

- 1. "Memorandum of Understanding"
- 2. "Internship Agreement Responsibilities"
- 3. Fall and Spring progress reports (2 per semester)

***If an internship is outside the TA community, then forms need to be printed, filled out and signed then they must be photographed and pasted on to a doc and then turned in to the Classroom. Students/families keep the paper copies for their records.

All the above forms must be completed within the first few weeks of each semester and turned in to the Internship Google Classroom.. The forms are available in the Internship Google Classroom in Doc format.

The "Memorandum of Understanding" is signed by TA's director and by the business at which the student is interning. This document is an agreement between the school and the business and it protects the business while students are participating in the internship.

The "Internship Agreement" is a form that details the volunteer, sports, or job opportunity. It must be signed by the student, mentor, coach or job supervisor, the coordinator of the TA Internship Program, the parent, and TA's director.

The Progress Reports are dated and must be completed by the supervising party-2 for each semester of internship credit-and must include a supervisor signature (digital signatures and initials. It is ok if the supervisor is a parent or a member of the TA community) and total hours.

Both progress reports turned in on time= A grade Only one progress report on time= C grade No progress report=No credit

All parties must provide their contact information for the form to be considered complete.

If a form is missing or incomplete, a student will not receive credit for their internship. Contact Mr. Weisfeld at weisfeld@taosacademy.org if you have any questions.

<u>Norms -</u> Respect time, come with solutions, win-win, champion a committee. This is a virtual Parent Advisory and Equity Council meeting for Taos Academy. Due to the Coronavirus (Covid-19) this meeting is being conducted in a Google Meet format.

Equity Council Goals - Bridging the gap for servicing subgroups and the needs for equity in educational opportunities. Cultural responsiveness is part of the process for this group and working on a positive school culture.

<u>Parent Advisory Goals</u> - Parents sharing ideas and concerns, champion a committee, find a place in the school where you can contribute, encourage other parents to participate.

5:45–6:15 Equity Council:

- Monthly Discussions February Economically Disadvantaged.
 - Communication to families regarding a culture of equity. Taos Academy is a Title 1 schoolwide. TA focuses on technology to support all students for advancement in digital literacy. Computers, high technology equipment, hot spots availability. TA is intentional on programming to support students with career development and helps to even the playing field for high tech educational options. Dual credit, internships, apprenticeships, STEM courses, leadership courses and opportunities, extra tutoring time, Friday virtual tutoring and support, snacks provided. Taos Academy foundation supports scholarships for those students in need for all courses if a fee is assigned.

- Staff professional learning continues to focus on using restorative practices to continue building strong relationships to support classroom norms and maximize learning time. See February newsletter for more info.
- Structured literacy across the curriculum- Training in a course on structured literacy to support strategies in reading and comprehension. Max Scholar is an online program to support reading and writing to support gaps in these areas.
- Inclusivity training in April Adrein Lawyer will be leading identity training for staff.
- What's all this about Norms? Restorative Practices from the Feb Newsletter. We have addressed norms as a school; the mask mandate being lifted, playground safety, public display affection, other COVID safety always comes into play as we continue to move forward with policy. Survey regarding mask wearing has been sent to the TA community. Window is open to respond. Majority of the students are wearing masks during outdoor activities. Comment by Lee thankful for the leadership team considering the emotional needs of students when adapting mask requirements.
- College and Career Readiness plus Jobs Fair Will be held at Taos Academy on Friday,
 April 1st, 2022 from 10a.m. to 2p.m. We currently have 9 area colleges attending in
 person and multiple businesses that provide opportunities in terms of support for students
 and community members as well as business/organizations offering internships and job
 opportunities. Community members and local high school students from area schools are
 encouraged to attend.
